A SHOCKING CONDITION OF AFFAIRS-RESULT OF THE INVESTIGATION OF A LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE.

The Vermont legislative committee to inquire into the management of the asylum for the insane at Brattleboro have made a report. They begin by expressing surprise at the discovery that the asylum really belongs, not to the State, but to a private corporation. The interest of the State in the property, now valued at half a million dollars, is simply that if it ceases to be an insane asylum the State has a lien upon it for security for the 323,000 heretofore invested. At the time of our first visit, we found the number of patients at the asylum to be 485-a number, as the committee believe, and as the officers of the institution admit in their testimony, far too large for the capacity of the buildings comfortably to provide.
