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REPORT OF THE SUPERVISORS OF THE INSANE FOR THE STATE OF VERMONT

To T. C. Dale, Commissioner of Public Welfare:

The State Board of Supervisors of the Insane submit the following report for the biennial term ending June 30, 1940.

Regular visits by the full Board have been made each month at the State Hospital at Waterbury and the Brattleboro Retreat at Brattleboro. At these meetings we have discharged State and part-pay patients as follows:

During the biennial term there have been received from the prison at Windsor seven convicts who had become insane, and seven have been transferred back to Windsor by the Governor's order upon recommendation by the Supervisors. There are 46 criminally insane now at the State Hospital—43 men and 3 women—as compared with 57 two years ago. During the biennial term 4 criminally insane were yet at the State Hospital and still insane when their sentence expired. These

4 were committed as regular patients by the Probate Court of Wahington County upon application to the Court by the Board of Supervisors.

Under our reciprocal agreement for the exchange of insane persons, legal residents of either state, we have received 13, and 13 applications have been denied; 4 have been accepted by other states and deported.

In the previous biennial term the balance was in favor of the State of Vermont.

This shows an increase of 2 State patients and a decrease of 9 private patients, a net decrease of 7. This is the first time in the history of the State Hopital that there has been a decrease in the number of patients in any biennial term.

So that considering both the State and private patients at Waterbury and the State patients at Brattleboro, there has been an actual decrease of 4. This is unprecedented, and yet with the increasing tendency toward hospitalization of mental cases, it is not probable that the peak of hospital population has arrived.

The people of Vermont may be assured that the patients, both at the State Hospital and the Brattleboro Retreat, have kindly care and scientific treatment; both are hospitals in fact and in every way well conducted. The Retreat has ample capacity and is constantly making improvements, so that it is well equipped for the care and treatment of State patients and all classes of private cases as well. The State Hospital is congested and is lacking in standard rooming capacity.

Beside the Brandon State School we have in the State for the care of patients with mental disease the Green Mountain Sanatorium and the Lake View Sanatorium, both private institutions located at Burlington, and both of very limited capacity. Also the Brattleboro Retreat, a private institution, well equipped, with generous capacity for the care of all classes of mental cases, and by arrangement with the State for \$6.00 a week receives State patients over and above the capacity of the State Hospital at Waterbury to receive them. The State Hospital is the only institution owned by the State for the care of mental cases, and none can be admitted or held there unless they are insane and dangerous and so certified to by two physicians not connected with the hospital.

But there are many cases throughout the State who need and are entitled to custodial and hospital care who cannot be received and held at the State Hospital, for the Statute requires that the Supervisors of the Insane discharge those who are non compos but not insane. These include idiots and low-grade adult and adolescent imbeciles, chronic invalids requiring hospital care, as well as various other types. Such indigent cases the overseers of the poor find it difficult or impossible to find suitable places for their care in private families, and the expense in local hospitals is far beyond the means of the town to meet, except for limited periods. The towns would be very willing to pay a dollar a day for the care of such cases, and in many cases the friends or relatives would be glad to pay this moderate charge, when they would not feel able to pay the rates charged by local hospitals.

Recommendation

By reason of the situation set forth in the preceding paragraphs, we recommend that the incoming Legislature make provision for the erection of a State Sanatorium to be located in connection with the State Hospital and to be under the same management in order to save overhead expense, the building to have capacity for caring for 150 or more patients, and the admissions should be limited to those who are mentally ill and require hospital and custodial care and include those who are a pubic menace or nuisance but not dangerously insane or commitable to the State Hospital.

By limiting the admissions in this manner the Sanatorium would not become a public boarding house, and some space might be available for the care of aged and bed-ridden cases now regular patients in the Hospital, and thus relieve somewhat the congestion there.



Should the Legislature feel disinclined to provide for the immediate construction of such a sanatorium, then we recommend that a committee of three or five be appointed to investigate the need of such a building and make recommendations as to its capacity as well as the kind of patients to be admitted and who should bear the expense of their maintenance.

We take this opportunity to extend to Dr. J. C. O'Neil, Superintendent of the State Hospital, and to Dr. Horace G. Ripley, Superintendent of the Brattleboro Retreat, our thanks and appreciation of their helpful co-operation in the work of the Board of Supervisors.

And to you, Commissioner Dale, we extend our thanks for your helpful suggestions in supervising the care of the insane in the State.
