The educational program of the Works Progress Administration is generally well known and the real benefits derived by underprivileged classes in general, and Negroes in particular, are generously commended upon. Each State has provided opportunity for illiteracy classes, adult education, and nursery schools. Some have provided opportunities for workers' education, education of the blind, and health education.

The second-half-year trend toward types of projects providing permanent or long-time benefits to the entire community is worthy of note, and more publicity. Typical of these are: Health education; Health clinics—medical and dental; nursing service; thermal pools; recreational facilities—community houses, playgrounds, parks, swimming pools, wading pools, gymnasiums; recreational personnel; visiting housekeepers service; and day nursery service. Hospital and schools were constructed and repaired.

Negro women in addition to large scale participation in sewing projects, and considerable participation in beautification (light manual labor) projects, have engaged in book binding, home demonstration, various types of char work, domestic service training, and in all white collar projects.
