HIER brown eyes wide with in-terest and a brief case under her arm, Dr. Dorothy Bird Nyswander, Utah's feminine con-tribution to the Brain Trust, ar-rived in Washington yesterday. Re-cently appointed Federal emer-

Re-cently appointed Federal emer-gency relief director of women's work in 11 western States, the youthfully energetic professor of psychology in the University of Utah, came to the Capitol to learn more about her new job. She will spend the next few days conferring with Acting Administra-tor Aubrey Williams and Mrs. Ellen S. Woodward, women's di-rector of FERA. Then she will plunge into the gigantic task to which she has devoted much of her spare time without compensation since last November. Having closed a summer course at the university Thursday, she will give full time to the emergency program until October, when she will again re-sume classes. Woman Brain Truster? Enthusiastic About FERA. Having worked after teaching bours on relief projects and de-voted much of her spare time to experimental work along this line, Dr. Nyswander is frankly enthus-iastic about the FERA. The wom-en's phase of the work especially interests her. "The program throughout is sound and scientifically planned," she said. "Each project is made to serve a multifold purpose. Under the Girection of the women's di-vision, thousands who need work are gainfully employed. Their ef-forts are expended in making use of the Nation's resources and sup-plics. Surpluses are used up, and subsequently, farmers and pro-ducers are aided." In illustration, she clied the four factories being erected in Utah in an effort to utilize a large share of the cotton surplus. There, women will be employed in manufacturing 10,000 mattresses and 20,000 com-forters. "This," she added, "is only one

"This," she added, "is only one of 82 such projects being carried out in our State alone. Other ac-tivities carried on by women under FERA throughout the 11 Western States include child, welfare and nursing centers, text book repair-ing, food canning and preservation, and recreational and educational projects.

Interested in Handicrafts.

"I am personally much interested in a revival of the handicrøfts," added the professor. In defense of professors in the Governmental scheme, Dr. Ny-swander sald:

In detense of professors in the Governmenial scheme, Dr. Ny-swander said: "They have, first of all scientific training which obviously and logically should qualify them in specialized work where expert knowledge is demanded. Accus-tomed to scientific procedure and experiment, they are inclined to attack social problems with open minds, instead of plunging into the lask with a set of blud convictions, They are not concerned with poli-tics. In fact, the ordinary professor rarely thinks to inquire to what political failth his coworkers be-long. He is too engrossed in ob-taining results. Last, but not least, they have acquired vocabulary. And that is of vast importance as a medium of expressing ideas in their proper light." Dr. Nyswander, who has a 15-year-old daughter, has academic
